Learning Vocabulary: Phrases with go

Go (to) + a place or event

We use phrases with go to + a place when we talk about going to a place for its intended purpose.

I'm **going to university**. = I'm going to study.

He's **going to prison**. = He's a criminal.

Go + -ing

It is common to use go + -ing when we are talking about leisure activities such as shopping, camping or fishing.

I went swimming on Sunday.

My boys **went surfing** for the first time.



Phrasal Verbs with go

Go for a + noun

You're going grey.

This is a useful informal structure. It's a common phrase for informal invitations and can also be used to talk about plans.

Go = become

Go can sometimes mean become which means to change from one

state to another. These expressions are often connected to the body.

It happens to us all, unless you go

What about **going for a meal** this weekend?

I should probably **go for a run**.

Go is often found in phrasal verbs such as go away, go down and go up. The best way to learn phrasal verbs is in context.

The price of butter has **gone up** again.

Prices never **go down**, do they?
